IT'S FULL steam ahead for the new Central Walk development in Drysdale, with civil works now back in full swing.

While the very wet winter has caused delays, the sniff of spring in the air in recent days has led to a flurry of work, with titles now expected to be issued by December.

Current civil works has seen Woodville Street closed, as it is being resurfaced, with new asphalt,

kerbing and stormwater drainage built.

As well, the real character of the development is starting to emerge, with some great environmental and cultural works.

The new public artworks – The Reeds – have a lovely feel, and are very distinctive and the wetlands features are being complimented by the planting of more than 30,000 trees, bushes and shrubs.

There is no doubting that this will be a real community, with emphasis on community walking and meeting areas, and a high standard of home design.

Just a short stroll from the centre of Drysdale, the development is very well located and will have a traditional Australian feel, with blocks starting at 600 square metres and going up to 850 square metres.
